

2026 EAGLES DRAFT PREVIEW

The Eagles head into the 2026 draft looking to get younger and cheaper on offense. They also need some help on defense, but only at a couple of spots. This is more about the future than the upcoming season. Howie Roseman has filled out the roster so the team could play next week and be okay. Obviously they want to find talented guys who can contribute this season, but there aren't any holes that will cause the Eagles to reach for a player to address a position of need. They can focus on finding the best players.

Let's look at the current roster. I focused on players who I think have a realistic chance for the 53-man roster or the practice squad.

The team doesn't currently have a long snapper. They will get this role filled after the draft. It is possible they could take one late, but might also go with a UDFAs or street free agent.

The elephant in the room is AJ Brown's future. I'm of the belief that he will be traded this summer. I expect the Eagles will add a WR in the draft. They don't have to address that spot in the first round.

They aren't trying to replace him one for one. Howie Roseman said they are trying to build a stronger overall group. He cited the fact they've been lucky in regard to injuries. You don't want two elite guys and a bunch of JAGs. The WR corps is deeper now than in years. Losing Brown will hurt, but adding a talented rookie will give new OC Sean Mannion a good group to work with.

POSITION REVIEW

QB – There isn't a need for a QB. That said, McKee is in the final year of his deal and the team might want to add someone to get ready for 2027. If they do that, it would mean carrying four QBs on the roster. The Eagles are one of the few teams who might be willing to do that. There is also the possibility of trading McKee. That could happen during the draft. The Eagles have looked at prospects who could go in the middle rounds as well as UDFAs. They will add a QB, either to the roster or the practice squad.

RB – No need for a RB. Barkley and Bigsby are a terrific 1-2 punch. Shipley is more of a third down back and KOR. Dameon Pierce was good in the past and is trying to show he's worthy of a roster spot. Some fans want him replaced, but the coaches seem to like him. The Eagles are looking at late round and UDFA prospects.

TE – The Eagles need to draft a TE. The key guys on the roster are on one-year deals. There is a need for a young player for the future, and hopefully the present. The Eagles are open about what they are looking for. They've checked out athletic pass-catchers and guys who can block. The key is to find someone who can be part of the TE group of the future. The player will certainly have a chance to contribute right away. They could go as early as the first round or as late as Day 3. This is a good TE class so there will be good options.

WR – The Eagles will draft a WR, regardless of the AJ situation. The veterans they signed are here for 2026 so this pick is mostly about the future. If the player is good enough, he will absolutely have a chance to play this season. This is a very good WR class. The Eagles have focused their attention on guys with speed. They could take a receiver as early as the first round, but Day 2 feels more likely.

OT – I've written about this a lot. The team is looking for Lane Johnson's long term replacement. If I had to bet a bag of Funyuns on the first round pick, I'm going with OT. They don't have to go tackle at 23. The need and the fit is just good because there should be a quality tackle available. The team has checked out some Day 2 prospects as well so there is flexibility.

OG – Another spot where there is a need for the future, possibly the present. Dickerson hopes to be healthy this season. If he is, he's one of the best OGs in the league. He struggled mightily last season and the Eagles can't go through that again. Steen was solid in 2025, but a very talented rookie could push him.

ED – When the Panthers overpaid for Jaelan Phillips it left the Eagles with a big hole in their defense. Maybe Jalyx Hunt is ready to step up and fill that spot. Nolan Smith should be healthy this year and his play should improve. Arnold Ebiketie and Joe Tryon-Shoyinka could be good role players. Still, you can never have enough pass rushers. The Eagles will take on in the draft. We just don't know who and how early.

DT - The Eagles have a good DL with Jalen Carter, Jordan Davis, Moro Ojomo and Byron Young. Ty Robinson didn't show much as a rookie, but the team was very high on him so let's give him a chance

to develop. There is always room for another talented big man. The question is what they are looking for. I think they would prefer an athletic DT who can rush the passer. Jonny Page who does excellent work for BGN thinks they need more of a run stuffer. It will be interesting to see what they do. If Brando Graham comes back, he can rush up the middle so that may push them to go for more of a run stuffer.

LB – Vic Fangio loves LBs. The departure of Nakobe Dean means there is room to add one. I don't see this as an early target, but never say never. Zack Baun will turn 30 this year so the team could take a LB earlier than expected. They have been checking out athletic LB prospects.

SAF – Drew Mukuba is set as one starter. I have Marcus Epps as the other starter, but he could be beaten out by a rookie. Epps is a good tackler and run defender. He's not as much of a playmaker as the Eagles prefer. This is a spot where the Eagles could take someone as early as the second round. This is a good safety class so the Eagles don't need to force things. If they can add an extra pick or two, I'd love to see them double-dip at safety.

CB – The starters are set for 2026. There is a need for a young player to play opposite of Mitchell for the long term. That guy could be picked this year, but doesn't have to be. The Eagles would probably like to address this position on Day 3.

TARGETS AT 23

The Eagles normally focus on five players they think will be available at or near their pick. This year the first round feels more uncertain than most years so I'll list more than five guys. I do think the focus will be edge rusher or offensive tackle. I don't think Monroe Freeling or Kadyn Proctor will last to 23 so I'll leave them off this list. Same for TE Kenyon Sadiq.

If the Eagles stay at 23, Iheanachor is the player I would hope for. I think he's got a chance to develop into a Pro Bowl RT. He could work at RG as a rookie if needed or if the team just wanted him on the field.

I'll have profiles on the players in a different section.

MOVING UP

I only see three players who are likely trade up targets.

OT Monroe Freeling
OT Kadyn Proctor
OG Vega Ioane

All three have very high ceilings and could be special players. Howie likes to target players he thinks could become elite. The price has to be right of course. He's not going to overpay for these players. If they slide down far enough to be within reach, Howie isn't afraid to pull the trigger and go get his guy.

Monroe Freeling is 6-7, 315. He ran 4.93 at the Combine. More importantly his 10-yard split was 1.71. That is exceptional for a man his size. Lane Johnson was 6-6, 308 and had a 10-yard split of 1.68. That hopefully provides some context for Freeling as a special athlete. I think he has the best footwork in the draft. He moves with an ease you just don't see very often. Footwork is key to OT success. Freeling isn't just an athlete. Put on the tape and you see a tough, physical blocker. He has long arms and big hands and knows how to use them. I think Freeling has the highest ceiling of any OL in the draft. He could be special.

He absolutely has Pro Bowl potential. He could become something even more than that. I think the low side for him would be like Kolton Miller, an OT who struggled for a few years before settling in and becoming good. I can't stress enough that Freeling does things with an ease that makes them look natural. Guys like that don't tend to bust. I also think facing top athletes in college (practice and games) will help him be ready for the guys he'll face in the NFL. He shouldn't be overwhelmed. He's only 21 so there is tremendous upside with him.

OT Kadyn Proctor could also be a target. He's 6-7, 352 and has good feet. The knock on Proctor is that he got up in the 380 to 390 range this season and didn't play to his full potential. Put on his tape against little R Mason Thomas and you'll see some issues. Proctor got in shape for the Combine and looked great. If his NFL team can keep the weight down, he could be a very good OT. I don't think he's got the same ceiling as Freeling, but he is unique due to his combination of size and footwork.

Proctor is the unicorn in this OL class because of his size and skills. Bama used him on trick plays as a runner/receiver. That's nuts. He can get good movement in the run game. He's a good pass protector. If you can keep him locked in, Proctor could become a stud OL and dominant type of player.

Vega Ioane is the highest graded OL in the draft. He will go somewhere in the 11-23 range because he's a guard and not a tackle. Ioane is 6-4, 320. He's strong, powerful and athletic. Penn State used him creatively to take advantage of his skill set. He can move guys off the ball in the run game or lock them up in pass pro. Daniel Jeremiah talks about how discouraged DL look when Ioane gets his hands on them cleanly. DL just give up. They aren't going to win. Ioane has heavy hands. When he hits guys, they feel it. He has quick feet. He anchors well in pass pro. He can pull and block on the move. He is a complete OG.

Ioane is also a high character guy. He is the type of player you absolutely love, on and off the field. The Eagles could take him and go get an OT on Day 2. Ioane would compete for the RG job right away. He's a plug 'n play type of prospect.

PROSPECTS

I will be listing my top players at each position. I will include profiles for some players that make sense for the Eagles.

Drew Allar – 6-5, 228 - Big QB with a big arm. Good athlete who can make plays with his legs. While he's got a strong arm, puts too much arc on his deep balls. Able to get away with that in college, but won't in the NFL. At his best working the middle of the field on intermediate routes. Allows him to take advantage of his arm strength. Only threw 13 INTs in 3 yrs as a starter. Decision making can be an issue for him. Accuracy on short throws is erratic. Might be second to Taven Green in terms of physical tools in this QB class, but didn't play to his full potential at PSU. A talented project who could be good value at the right price.

Cade Klubnik – 6-2, 207 - 3-year starter who put up huge numbers in 2024 and then had a down senior season. Ran well at his Pro Day. Had a 55-yard TD run vs NCSU in 2024 so that athleticism shows up n games. Too casual with his play fakes. Can throw on the move. Good accuracy on his deep balls. Puts good touch on them as well. Very catchable. Makes some really impressive throws. Offense had him making a lot of quick reads. Got the ball out quickly and on target. Accurate passer. Receivers get the ball on the move and are able to add YAC. Good arm. Handles pressure pretty well. Footwork can be sloppy at times. Klubnik has the physical tools, skills and experience to become a starting QB

in the NFL.

Cole Payton – 6-3, 232 - One-year starter with outstanding mobility. Ran for 777 yards and 13 TDs in 2025. Left-handed passer. Good accuracy on downfield throws. Throws well on the move. Good arm. Played in a run heavy offense. Only threw 225 passes as a senior, only 283 for his career. Good athlete. Payton is a project because he hasn't been in an offense focused on the passing game and he lacks ideal experience. Has the size, athleticism and tools to develop into an NFL QB.

Haynes King – 6-3, 212 - Played 3 years at Texas A&M and then 3 more at GT. Good runner who developed into a solid passer at the college level. Tough as nails. Ran for 953 yards and 15 TDs as a senior. Took a pounding. Good athlete. Solid arm. Erratic pocket passer. Has some plays where he looks like a quality veteran QB. Other times he looks like an athlete trying to get the job done. Lots of short, quick throws. Had some success on deep balls. Puts a lot of arc on them. Could be a good backup QB at the next level. Teams will value his athleticism, toughness and leadership. Must become a more consistent passer.

Notes – Not a strong class after Love. The Eagles seem set at RB, but could look for someone if they think he can be an upgrade on Will Shipley (runner/receiver/KOR). If no one is drafted, this will be a priority UDFA spot.

Nick Singleton – Penn State – 6-0, 219 - Set school records with 5,586 career all-purpose yards, 55 total career TDs. Played in 12 games with 4 starts (123-549-4.5, 13 TDs rushing; 24-219-9.1, TD receiving; 7-145-20.7 KR). Would have put up bigger numbers, but he split carries with Kaytron Allen. Downhill RB with good speed. Can fly when he gets some space. Good receiver. Good KOR. Physical runner who won't go down on first contact, but not a power runner. Good pass blocker. Shows good vision as a runner. Not overly elusive, but does make good cuts. Singleton has 14 runs of 40+ yards in his career (trails only Jeanty in FBS during that time). Could be better pro than college player. Teams will value his versatility.

Eli Heidenreich – Navy - 6-0, 198 - Could be WR or RB. Led team with 51 receptions, set school single-season record with 941 receiving yards (18.5 per). Tied school record with 6 receiving TDs. Set school career records with 1,994 receiving yards, 16 receiving TDs. Started all 13 games (77-499-6.5, 3 TDs rushing). Gifted receiver. Knows how to get open. Has very good hands. Good downfield receiver. Good effort as a blocker. Most of his runs were sweeps. Good blocker and physical player. Could be an outstanding role player in the right offense. Posted great testing numbers, very similar to Christian McCaffrey's. Ran 4.44. 35-inch vertical. 3-cone time of 6.50.

Deamonte Trayanum – Toledo – 5-11, 224 - After a solid season for Ohio State in 2023, Trayanum transferred to Kentucky the following year, yet never fit in. He then moved to Toledo last season and produced career numbers of 1,015 rushing yards with 12 TDs, as well as 21 receptions for 212 yards. Run to daylight guy. Uses his speed to make a lot of big plays at Toledo. Not very elusive. Will lower his shoulder and run over some tacklers. Has good size and strength. Solid receiver. Ran 4.52.

Jamal Haynes – Georgia Tech – 5-9, 190 - Former WR moved to RB in 2023. Thrived at his new position. Ran for 2,534 yards and 21 TDs over three seasons. Numbers decreased every year. Injuries were part of that. Remained a productive playmaker. Caught 81 career passes. Natural pass catcher. Mainly a N-S runner. Does show good cutback ability. Can be shifty, but isn't overly elusive. Good balance. Has quick feet. Shows good patience and vision as a runner. Has the potential to be a good role player at the next level. Ran 4.51 at his Pro Day. Had a 39.5-inch vertical.

KC Concepcion – Texas A&M - 6-0, 196 - Trf from NC State. Explosive playmaker. Caught 185 passes in career. Was 61-919-9 in 2025. Dynamic when the ball is in his hands, whether as runner, receiver or returner. Has good instincts as a runner. Just explodes up the field when he gets an opening. More of a body catcher than you'd ideally like. Doesn't have great hands. Can make some tough catches. Will go up and get the ball. Ran a lot of vertical routes in college. Good route-runner who shows a great feel for getting open. Not just elusive, but also runs through arm tackles. Tough to get down. Has added value as a PR. Big time playmaker with special RAC ability.

Chris Bell – Louisville – 6-2, 222 - Big, strong receiver who excels at working the middle of the field.

Outstanding RAC ability. Catches the ball in stride and turns upfield immediately. No hesitation. Smart player who understands how to get open. Physical player who can catch through contact. Fearless when going over the middle and dealing with traffic. Good hands. Tore his ACL so that will affect his value after medical evaluations. Has the potential to be a good starting receiver in the NFL.

De'Zhaun Stribling – Ole Miss – 6-2, 207 - Caught 216 passes for 23 TDs over five seasons. Went 55-811-6 in 2025. Excellent combination of size and speed. Good vertical threat. Able to run by some CBs. Was used on some short routes and showed good RAC ability. Played well against top competition. Good on back shoulder fades. Able to make some tough catches. Limited route tree. Has good hands. Smart player.

Bryce Lance – NDSU – 6-3, 204 - Dominant player at his level due to great combination of size and speed. Was able to just run fight by some of the guys covering him. Limited route tree so he's not the most polished receiver. Has good RAC ability. Can really eat up ground. Good in the red zone. Uses his size well in going up for the ball. Has good hands. Does a good job on back shoulder throws. Is able to adjust well to the ball and haul it in. Needs to develop as a route-runner, but has big time potential as a field stretcher and playmaker. Lance posted gaudy numbers over the past two seasons. In 2024 he was 75-1053-17 and in last season he was 51-1079-8. Averaged 17 yards per catch for his career.

Malik Benson – Oregon - 6-0, 189 - Bounced around before finding a home at Oregon in 2025 and playing his best football. Led team with 719 receiving yards (43 receptions, 16.7 per, 6 TDs). Played in all 15 games with 8 starts. Explosive playmaker. Has elite speed and it shows up as a receiver and punt returner. Dangerous vertical threat. Able to run right by DBs. Tracks the ball well and has good hands. Will play in the slot. Willing to work the middle of the field. Has good RAC ability. Needs work as a route runner. Relies on his speed to get open which won't work as well in the NFL. Ran 4.37.

Caleb Douglas – Texas Tech – 6-4, 206 - Led team with 846 receiving yards (54-846-15.7), 7 receiving TDs. Played all 14 games. Ran great at the Combine, but you don't see that speed on tape. Doesn't create much separation. Did a good job on contested catches. Struggled in the gauntlet drill at the Combine. Hands looked fine during the season. Willing blocker in the run game. Doesn't stand out on tape, but size and speed make him an interesting prospect. Ran 4.39.

TE

Notes – I love this TE class. You have options whether you want an athletic receiver or a big Y-type of TE who can really block. This is such a deep group that it wouldn't shock me to see them take two TEs.

Kenyon Sadiq – Oregon – 6-3, 241 - Highly athletic TE. Has a rare combination of speed and explosiveness. Lacks ideal size, but don't let that fool you! He is a tough, physical player. Good blocker, in-line or on the move. Excellent effort. Works hard to sustain blocks. Solid receiver. Able to make tough catches. Adjusts well to the ball. Doesn't have great hands and has more drops than you'd like. Has good RAC ability. Went 51-560-8 in 2025. Good red zone weapon. Unique player with potential to be a good starting TE at the next level. Ran 4.39 at the Combine and had a vertical of 43.5 inches. Explosive athlete.

Oscar Delp – Georgia – 6-5, 245 - Great athlete and showed that in his Pro Day workout. Ran 4.45 and had a vertical of 38.5 inches. Also a good blocker. Excellent effort. Works hard to sustain blocks. Plays with good leverage. Won't overpower with size or strength. Outstanding RAC ability. You can really see his speed. Good hands. Able to make some tough grabs. Played season with a hairline fracture in his foot without knowing. Found out at Combine medical check. Has potential to be a stud in the NFL, especially in an offense with a focus on RAC yards. Never a volume receiver. Finished career 70-854-9.

Eli Stowers – Vanderbilt – 6-4, 239 - Former QB turned into gifted pass catcher. Natural hands catcher who plucks the ball with ease. Outstanding athlete. Had a terrific showing at the Combine. Ran 4.51 and jumped 45.5 inches. Good RAC ability. Not a traditional TE. An F type who can line up in the slot or outside. Lacks the strength and physicality to be a good in-line blocker. Will win some battles out in space. Went 62-769-4 in 2025. Could be an excellent weapon in the passing game for an NFL team.

Nate Boerkircher – Texas A&M - 6-5, 245 - A true 2-way TE. Only caught 38 career passes, with 19 coming in 2025. Might lack production, but has good receiving skills. Smooth route runner who shows a good feel for getting open. You could really see some of that in the Senior Bowl practices. Good blocker. Big frame and can add bulk if needed. Spent most of career at Nebraska. Will be a better pro than college player. More quick than fast. Only ran 4.78 at his Pro Day. Had a very good 3-cone time of 7.03.

Justin Joly – NC State – 6-4, 241 - Good pass catcher. Shows a good feel for getting open. Good route runner. Has big hands and is a smooth pass catcher. Adjusts well to the ball. Can make tough catches. Able to catch the ball through contact. Used mostly as an underneath target. Has good RAC ability and is a smooth, fluid athlete.. Not much of an in-line blocker, but is effective on the move. Good effort so there is something to work with. Caught 166 passes over his career so he's a proven pass-catcher. Had 7 TDs last season. Could become a good starting TE in the NFL.

Sam Roush – Stanford – 6-6, 267 - Big, powerful TE with good athleticism. Fast for his size. Outstanding blocker. He's physical and strong. Blocks with good leverage and works hard to sustain blocks. Solid receiver. Has good hands. Runs well in open space. Mostly a straight line guy. Can be a

little upright and stiff at times. Production went up each season and finished with 119 career catches. Not a big playmaker, but a true Y TE who can do it all.

Dallen Bentley – Utah – 6-4, 253 - Had a breakout season in 2025. Tied for the team lead with 6 receiving TDs (48-620-12.9). Played in all 13 games with 12 starts. Willing blocker with good effort. Athletic pass catcher with good RAC ability. Shows good hands. Can play in the slot or in-line. Good vertical receiver. Athleticism shows up on tape. Had a great showing at his Pro Day, running 4.59 and posting a SS time of 4.18. That shows exceptional agility. Had a good showing at the Shrine Game. Already 25 and that will hurt his value a bit.

Bauer Sharp – LSU – 6-5, 249 - Started all 13 games (24-252-10.5, 2 TDs receiving). Athletic pass catcher with good RAC ability. Athleticism shows up in games. Shows good potential as a blocker. Followed up a strong showing at the Shrine Game with a good workout at the Combine. Ran 4.63 and had a 35-inch vertical. Looked good in the on-field stuff as well. Talented player with interesting potential.

Solid pass protector. Has pretty good feet but speed rushers will give him problems. Just watch his matchup with R Mason Thomas. Sloppy with his hands at times. Showed up at the Combine in great shape and was highly impressive. If he can control his weight and work on his pass pro Proctor could be a stud OT. Could also slide into OG and be a Pro Bowl level player. Has a lot of potential. A unicorn prospect due to his rare combination of size, footwork and athleticism.

Monroe Freeling – Georgia - 6-7, 315 - 18 career starts. Played LT. Has the highest upside of any OT in the class. Great combination of size and athleticism. Smooth mover with great feet. Looks like he was born to play LT. Only one year of starting experience in college so he still has plenty to learn. Good run blocker. Does a really good job on the second level. Shows his mean streak when he's able to

block DBs out in space. Plays with good awareness. Always looking for work. Even when he does get beat he doesn't panic. Has the footwork and length to recover. Keeps his feet active and is able to mirror rushers. Needs to get stronger. He's only 21 so he's just scratching the surface of what he can become. Plays with natural bend and uses his hands well. Pulls well and can really block on the move. He's under control because of his athleticism.

Max Iheanachor – Arizona State - 6-5, 321 - Started for 2.5 years at RT. Trf from JC. Outstanding combination of size and athleticism. Got a late start at playing football so he is still a bit raw but has tremendous potential. Natural knee-bender with good feet. Plays with good balance. Does need to anchor better. Will get knocked back in pass pro at times. Shows a mean streak. Can be a very good run blocker at times. Faced a gauntlet of good pass rushers in the Big 12 and more than held his own. Had a good showing at the Senior Bowl and then was great at the Combine. Might need some work before he's ready to start, but has Pro Bowl level talent.

Blake Miller – Clemson - 6-7, 317 - 4-year starter at RT. Tall, athletic build. Has good feet and looks natural as a pass protector. Plays with a wide base. Can be too upright at times. Does show good pad level when run blocking. Good effort in the run game and shows a nasty streak. Blocks well on the move. Good athlete. Technically sound player with a lot of experience. Doesn't have the ceiling of some of the other OTs, but his experience and skill set should have him ready to compete for a starting job right away.

Travis Burke – Memphis - 6-9, 325 - 3-year starter. Played at FIU and G-Webb before Memphis. Has LT experience from FIU. Was RT at Memphis. Has 46 career starts. Massive OT with a real nasty streak. Loves to pound on defenders. Puts more guys on the ground than any other blocker in the draft class. He is tall, but is a knee bender. Pretty good athlete. Moves well, especially for his size. Uses his length well in pass pro. A big man who plays big. Probably Jon Runyan's favorite prospect in the draft because of his style of play.

Austin Barber – Florida – 6-7, 318 - Started 30 games at LT. Has a medium athletic build. Good feet. Natural knee bender. Can be sloppy with his hands. Can really latch onto defenders at times, but will also have his share of misses. Comes off the ball well on run plays. Plays with good strength and power. Smart blocker. Shows a nasty streak. Does a good job when blocking out in space. Solid athlete. Had injury issues in the past, but played 25 games over the past two seasons. Some feel he could actually be a better OG than OT.

Markell Bell – Miami – 6-9, 346 - Massive LT. Started 5 games in '24 and then all of '25. JC transfer. Has arms like vines. Rare combination of size and length. Actually has pretty good feet. When he bends his knees and plays with good balance Bell is a good pass protector. As everyone saw at the Senior Bowl, he can be run over if he's too upright and unbalanced. Was up and down in Mobile. Had a good workout at the Combine. Still feels raw. If he can polish his skills, Bell could develop into a starting OT. Won't appeal to every team, but some will fall in love with his size and potential.

Caleb Tiernan – Northwestern – 6-8, 323 - 3-yr starter at LT. Had 5 starts at RT as freshman. Tall, high cut build. Lacks ideal arm length despite big frame. Veteran blocker who is smart. Understands the importance of angles and positioning. Will cheat back on some pass plays. You can see that in the Michigan game. Still struggled with their speed rushers at times. Has pretty good feet. Blocks well out in space. Better pass blocker than run blocker for now. Looked good in his Combine workout. Has potential to be a starting OT.

PSU used him creatively at times. Would put him in motion and use him as a lead blocker. Has the athleticism and movement skills to do that. Blocks well in space. Has a powerful build and is a physical player. Good with his hands. Able to get movement in the run game. Heavy hands. Will absolutely knock the crap out of some defenders. Has a real nasty streak.

Chase Bisontis – Texas A&M – 6-5, 315 - 3-year starter at LG. Good pass blocker. Plays with a wide base and stays square. Good with his hands. Shows excellent awareness vs blitzes and stunts. Has great feet. Smooth mover. Keeps his feet active and that helps him sustain blocks. Quick off the ball. Plays with good pad level. Anchors well. Solid run blocker. Not physically dominant, but does a good job of winning with positioning and angles. Really athletic blocker. Looks like a starting guard in the NFL.

Emmanuel Pregnon – Oregon – 6-4, 314 - 4-yr starter at LG. Began at Wyoming in 2020. Went to USC after that and finished at UO in 2025. Strong, physical run blocker. Has heavy hands and knows how to use them. More of a waist bender than you would prefer. When he sinks his hips, generates good power and can move DL off the ball. Mostly a straight line guy, but can get up to the second level. Has some real pop when he hits. Terrific run blocker. Good quickness off the ball. Has more killshots than any other OL in the draft. Nasty dude.

Keylan Rutledge – Georgia Tech – 6-4, 316 - 4-yr starter. 2 at GT and MTSU before that. Anchors well. Strong. Uses his hands well. Keeps the rusher off his body and under control. Got some C reps in Mobile. Quick off the ball. Smart blocker with good awareness. Can flatten guys at the second level. Good feet. Works hard to sustain blocks. Always finds work. Has a good combination of being a grinder who will really battle you while also being a good athlete who can win on the move.

Jalen Farmer – Kentucky – 6-5, 312 - 24 starts at RG. Trf from Florida. Thick build. Quick feet. Good run blocker. Very good on short pulls. Has some real pop. Does a good job of sustaining blocks.

Plays under control. Good athlete. Brawler. Really gets after guys in the run game. Good pass blocker as well. Good showing at the Senior Bowl. Can be a little too upright at times. Anchors with a wide base and is tough to move back in pass pro. Plays with good awareness. Love his tenacity.

Puts guys on the ground when he's got the chance. Good on reach blocks. Had a good showing at the Senior Bowl. Smart blocker who understand the importance of angles/positioning.

Beau Stephens – Iowa – 6-6, 315 - 3-yr starter. Spent 2 at LG and one at RG. Has good feet. Comes off the ball well. Plays with good leverage. Really latches on and sustains blocks. Good on reach blocks. Effective on pulls. Real physical player. Nasty. Good in pass pro. Smart player and technically sound. Not a great athlete, but one heck of a blocker. One of my favorite players in the draft. Maximum effort guy who will battle you every second of the game.

Jeremiah Wright – Auburn – 6-5, 331 - 2-yr starter at RG. Began career on DL. Thick build. Good size. Has good feet and moves well. Shows a good nasty streak. Buries guys when he's got the chance. Showed his good footwork at the Senior Bowl. Can be a very good pass blocker. Anchors well. Knows how to use his hands. Has some serious pop when he hits. Keeps his feet going on contact. Doesn't pull a lot but shows good potential. Plays with excellent awareness. Can really lock guys up when he gets his hands on them cleanly. Straight line guy who isn't great at pulling. Can be sloppy with his hands. Big guy who plays big.

Keldric Faulk – Auburn – 6-6, 276 - Long, tall edge who is best suited to be a 4-3 DE. Did drop into coverage at times. Not ideal, but was effective. Versatile enough to line up all over the front. Disruptive with his combination of size and athleticism. Good run defender. Good motor. Will chase plays all over

the field. Fast enough to chase down RBs and WRs, as well as QBs. Has really good power and will knock back blockers at times. Highly disruptive. Even when he doesn't make plays, seems to create some chaos. Does a good job of shedding blocks and getting to the ball or into the backfield. Had 11 TFLs and 7 sacks as a junior. Numbers fell to 5 TFLs and 2 sacks as a senior. Was disruptive even when he didn't make the play. Only 21 so he has a lot of upside.

TJ Parker – Clemson - 6-4, 263 - Looked very good in Senior Bowl practices. Able to win with bull rush and inside move. Uses hands/arms well. Gets into blocker and gets him off balance. Had 11 sacks and 6 FF in 2024, but only 5 sacks and no FF in 2025. His good tape is really good. Can fly off the edge and pressure the QB. Also good when dropping back in coverage. Solid run defender who will take on blockers and work to find the ball. Plays under control, but aggressively. Good awareness. Hard to explain the drop off in production. Did have to learn a new scheme and it put him in some tough situations. You don't see a lack of effort. Finished on a high note with a great game vs SC in the season finale and then had a strong showing at the Senior Bowl. Tough, physical player who can take on blockers and disengage. Good combination of size, length and athleticism.

Malachai Lawrence – UCF – 6-4, 253 - Gifted athlete with good size. Had 7 sacks, 2 FF in 2025. His combination of burst and bend makes him tough to block when coming off the edge. Outstanding motor. Relentless going after the ball. Great lateral agility. Good with his hands. Might get blocked, but won't stay blocked. Has a good frame with long arms. Has good size. Physical player. Will run through blockers, not always around them. Tested well at the Combine and was excellent at the Shrine Game. Ran 4.52 and had a 40-inch vertical at the Combine. Great athlete.

R Mason Thomas – Oklahoma – 6-2, 241 - Undersized speed rusher who can fly off the edge. Plays with great leverage. Doesn't seem to know he's undersized and really battles. Plays bigger than he is. Had 9 sacks as a junior and 6.5 as a senior. Good get off. Able to get under the pads of OTs on a regular basis. Does struggle to disengage when they are able to get their hands on him. Good motor. Will battle as a run defender. Effective when he's able to play with good leverage. There are multiple plays where he got OL off balance and moved them with ease. Relentless motor. There is a play in the Auburn game where he chases the RB 45 yards down the field and makes the play. His size and frame won't appeal to every team, but he isn't your typical finesse speed rusher.

Derrick Moore – Michigan – 6-4, 255 - Tough, physical edge. Disruptive player. Good vs run and as pass rusher. Impressive showing at Senior Bowl. Can win inside, outside or with power. Loves to collapse the pocket. Fires into the chest of OL and drives them back. Good athlete. Plays hard and will make his share of hustle plays. Had 10 sacks and 2 FF in 2025. Needs to develop his pass rush game, but has the strength and athleticism to get to the QB.

Dani Dennis-Sutton – Penn State – 6-6, 256 - Incredibly talented prospect who doesn't always play to his potential. Can be an outstanding pass rusher. Had 8.5 sacks, 3 FF in 2025. Had 8.5 sacks, 2 FF in 2024. Has excellent size. Can line up all over and win in different ways. Uses a good shoulder dip to get by OTs. If they overset he will shoot inside. Will line up over guards and uses a wicked spin move to blow by them. Disruptive player. The issues are that he can get stuck on blocks at times. He's got to do a better job of disengaging. Has an inconsistent motor. Looks good at times, but doesn't consistently play with a sense of urgency. Good athlete who can drop into coverage and do a good job. Had 1 INT while in coverage. A whirling dervish. Explodes off the ball and creates chaos. Has a lean athletic build. Very good motor. Made a sensational play in space against a QB. Mirrored him and then chased him down. Looked more like a LB than a DT. Got better throughout college. Had 43 tackles, 13 TFLs and 9 sacks as a senior. Had a strong showing at the Shrine Game. Won't appeal to every team, but he's your guy if you want a disruptive interior rusher with playmaking ability.

Chris McClellan – Missouri – 6-4, 313 - NT who is a surprisingly good pass rusher. Uses a combination of power and lateral agility to get by/around blockers. Had 48 tackles and 6 sacks as a senior. Has a good motor for a big guy. Works hard to get to the QB. Uses his long levers to control blockers and hold the POA. Versatile DL who can fit multiple schemes and fill multiple roles.

Does a good job of getting off blocks and to the ball. Technically sound. Seems to really understand how to use leverage to hold his ground.

Tyler Onyedim – Texas A&M – 6-4, 292 - Athletic, disruptive DT. Quick off the ball. Excellent agility. Good spin move. Uses quick first step to get into gaps and blow up plays. Good with his hands. Lined up all over the place and was effective in multiple roles. Transferred from Iowa State and really came alive in an attacking system. Finished season with 48 tackles and 2.5 sacks. Had a good showing at the Shrine Game.

Jordan van den Berg – Georgia Tech – 6-3, 310 - Trf from PSU. Former rugby player. Highly athletic DT. Very quick off the ball. Can burst upfield or go around the blocker with his lateral quickness. Tough to block. Ideal for 3T, but played a lot of 1T/0T in college. Stays low and is tough to move. Will take on double teams. Good motor. Plays with urgency. Makes his share of hustle plays. Played well in 2024, but really came into his own as a senior. Had 44 tackles, 11 TFLs and 3 sacks. 24 years old. Athletic enough to be disruptive, but also willing to do the dirty work.

Notes – This is a good group of LBs at the top. Things fall off after that, but there are still interesting prospects late in the draft. Eagles have shown interest in multiple LBs. Jacob Rodriguez – Texas Tech – 6-1, 231 - Athletic LB. Uncanny knack for causing fumbles. Had 7 FF in 2025 and 13 for his career. That's a skill, not luck. Had 4 INTs in 2025. Had 5 sacks in 2024. Just a playmaker. Makes things happen. Wrap-up tackler. Plays fast and covers a lot of ground. Solid run defender. Will take on blockers. Fills well. Good in coverage. Had a good showing at the Senior Bowl and also the Combine. Checking all the boxes.

CJ Allen – Georgia – 6-1, 230 - Smart player. Wrap-up tackler. Good closing speed. Will take on blockers. Able to shed and go get the ball. Physical player. Good range. Tackles well in space. Has some real pop when he hits. Runs through his targets. Had a terrific senior season: 88 tackles, 4 PDs, 3.5 sacks, 2 FF. Suffered a minor knee injury in November. Played his way through it, showing real toughness. The injury kept him from doing athletic testing. His game tape shows his speed and athleticism.

Kyle Louis – Pitt – 6-0, 220 - Undersized speedy LB who made a ton of big plays over the past two seasons. Had 179 tackles, 6 PDs, 10 sacks, 2 FF, and 6 INTs. Not too shabby. Really flies around the field. Outstanding in pass coverage. Very good at slipping blocks. Has good hands and had some impressive picks. Smart, instinctive player who shows a really good feel for the game. Physical tackler. Good showing at the Senior Bowl. Some teams may want Louis as a safety. Has the skill set to play there.

Josiah Trotter – Missouri – 6-2, 237 - Attacking LB who is at his best going downhill. Has a knack for getting into the backfield and being disruptive. Posted 84 tackles, 13 TFLs and 2 sacks in 2025. Shows good speed and athleticism. Strong tackler. Wraps up and puts guys down forcefully. Likes to slip blocks rather than taking them on. Can shed when he does do it. Doesn't drop into coverage a lot. Used as a blitzer, rusher or spy. When he does drop back, tends to have his eyes in the backfield. Will need to work on that to be a 3-down LB at the next level.

Keyshaun Elliot – Arizona State – 6-2, 231 - Led team with 14 TFLs, 7 sacks. Started 12 games (98 tackles, 2 PBU). Big time playmaker as a senior. Wears the green dot. Tends to take on blockers with his shoulder. Will need to use his hands better at the next level. Good in the box. Good athlete. Takes good angles to the ball. Wrap up tackler. Aggressive, but plays under control. Tough enough to play in traffic, athletic enough to play in space. Could be a starting LB at the next level.

Harold Perkins – LSU – 6-1, 223 - Former edge rusher moved to LB. Looked dynamic as a freshman, but doesn't have the size for edge rusher at the next level. Small frame, short arms. Developed into a good LB. Did have 13 sacks and 6 FFs in those first two seasons. Gifted athlete who flies around the field. Really good in pursuit. Very good COD ability. Tackling can be sloppy. Hits more than he wraps up. Loves to shoot gaps and attack up the field. Disruptive player. I don't know that he's got the size or instincts to be a starting LB in the NFL, but his speed and playmaking ability could make him a valuable role player and STer.

Notes – This is an outstanding group of safeties. The Eagles will definitely take one (barring an unexpected trade). They prefer guys who have nickel experience and/or are good in man coverage. If the Eagles can acquire an extra Day 3 pick, I'd love them to take two safeties. There is room on the depth chart for them.

Has the speed and range to cover deep. Works hard to get to the ball. Very good ball skills. Playmaker finished his career with 8 FF and 5 INTs. Gets a good break on the ball. Aggressive, but plays under control. Got burned for a long TD run vs UK when he focused on the QB fake and let the RB go right by him. Generally is a smart player.

Dillon Thieneman – Oregon – 6-0, 201 - Trf from Purdue. Played a lot of deep safety there. Had 6 INTs in 2023. Went to Oregon and was used closer to the LOS to get him more involved. Great athlete. Has excellent range when playing deep. Good ball skills. Solid hitter. Plays with suddenness. Wrap up tackler. Could be stronger. More than a few drag down tackles. That won't work as well at the next level. Versatile DB who can handle a variety of roles. Good man cover skills.

Treydan Stukes – Arizona – 6-1, 190 - 6-year player. Already 24 years old. Tied for the team lead with 4 INTs. Started 10 games (52 tackles, 1 sack, 6 PBUs). Nickel/safety. Good size. Great ball skills. Makes some highly impressive INTs. Great vision. Smart player who is good with positioning and angles. Solid tackler. Has a really good understanding of positioning in man coverage. Has outstanding range. Covers a lot of ground. Smart player who trusts his eyes and attacks when the play is in front of him. Gets a good break on the ball. Aggressive player. Has the versatility and athleticism to be valuable to a defense. Ran 4.32 at the Combine.

Jalon Kilgore – South Carolina – 6-1, 210 - Has played CB and S. Wrap-up tackler. Physical player. Plays down in the box a lot. Comfortable playing in traffic and fighting through blocks to get to the ball. Can play nickel. Excellent awareness. Good ball skills. Good athlete with a sturdy frame. Has great hands. Excellent awareness. Covers a lot of ground on the back end. Very good break on the ball. Not a great hitter or tackler, but the kind of playmaker teams are looking for. Can be upright in his backpedal when he plays off. That slows him down as he transitions to turn and run with the receiver. Better in man coverage when he plays press. Will turn 24 in May. Ran 4.41, excellent speed for a safety.

Jakobe Thomas – Miami – 6-1, 211 - Went from MTSU to Tennessee to Miami. Good at all three stops. Big time playmaker. Had 5 INTs, 2 FF, 3.5 sacks and 6 PDs as a senior. Finished career with 9 INTs and 16 PDs. Smart, patient player. Has great ball skills. Can be a big hitter. Good blitzer. Has excellent closing speed. Physical tackler, but misses more than he should. Makes plays all over the field. Can be overly aggressive at times.

Kamari Ramsey – USC – 6-0, 202 - Mostly plays deep when he's at safety. Does a good job of diagnosing plays. Gets a good break on the ball. Decisive. Sees things and reacts quickly. Does a good job of transitioning from backpedal to driving on the ball. Good ball skills. Played nickel in 2025. Comfortable in man coverage. Physical tackler. Good range. Solid hitter. Showed playmaking potential while focused on safety in 2024. Had 2 INTs and 5 PDs. He has okay size and ran 4.47, which is good speed for a safety. Has fluid hips. I love the way he trusts his eyes and attacks.

Genesis Smith – Arizona – 6-2, 202 - Physical hitter and tackler. Good size. Finished career with 165 tackles, 5 INTs, 4 FF and 14 PDs. Can line up all over the field and in multiple roles. Can play the slot. Looks good in man coverage. Does a good job of reading the QB and then attacking the ball. Has good hands. Has quick feet and good change of direction ability. Showed explosiveness at the Combine and his athleticism shows up on the field.

Jalen Huskey – Maryland – 6-1, 196 - Has started at CB and S. Played S in 2025. Tied for the team lead with 4 INTs. Played in all 12 games with 11 starts. (72 tackles, 1.5 TFLs, 2 PBU). Has 11 career INTs. Tackles like a corner at times. Just throws his body at the target. Doesn't wrap up consistently. Looks good on other plays. Plays deep a lot and is good at it. Moves well and gets a good break on the ball. Will hit. Love the way he triggers when he sees the ball going to a receiver in front of him. No hesitation.

Gets a good break on the ball when playing off. Knows how to use his length/size in coverage. Can really smother receivers with his size, length and athleticism. He is high cut and doesn't have great hips. Can be physical without being too grabby. Does a good job of staying in phase on downfield routes. Ran 4.41.

Ephesians Prysock – Washington – 6-3, 196 - Quick, athletic corner with excellent size. Comfortable in press or playing off. Faced some great receivers in 2025 and held his own. Finished career with 42 starts, 2 INTs and 20 PDs. 33 1/8" arms, he's a super long corner. He played more than 2,600 defensive snaps over 49 college games and had a strong showing at the Senior Bowl. Mainly plays off. Gets a good break on the ball. Plays big. Knows how to use his size/length. Good feet. Solid tackler. Ran 4.45.

Charles Demmings – Stephen F. Austin – 6-1, 193 - 26 career PBUs. 4 INTs in 2025. Started 12 games (18 tackles, 5 PBUs). Loves to press and be physical with receivers. Will hit. Latrell McCutchin – Houston – 6-2, 191 - Led team with 10 PBU. Started 13 games (51 tackles, 3 TFLs with 1 sack, FF, blocked kick). Good STer. Really good athlete. Doesn't always show that in his play. At his best pressing and jamming receivers. Not as effective when playing off. Receivers get by him more than you would expect for a guy with his athleticism. Physical tackler. Ran 4.43.
